OUR ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

The recipient-service monkey partnership is an interactive relationship. Our recipients must be able to direct the care and behavior of their service animal, and follow guidelines in training, health, and diet for their monkey in order to be successful in our program. The applicant must:

- 1 Be at least one year post-injury or post-diagnosis.
- 2 Identify a reliable caregiver or family member who agrees to assist in the daily care of the monkey.
- 3 Spend most of his/her time at home.
- 4 Have sufficient motor ability to control a manual or electric wheelchair.
- 5 Have unimpaired cognitive function.
- 6 Be responsible and mature (and over the age of 18).
- 7 Be able to communicate verbally and in English.
- 8 Not have children under the age of 12 living in the home.
- 9 Show motivation and commitment to apply for and provide long term care for a service animal.
- 10 Demonstrate patience, adaptability—and have a sense of humor.

Please note that the presence of certain impairments may disqualify an applicant from receiving a monkey helper:

- Significant psychiatric or emotional impairments
- Individuals who are ventilator dependent
- Blindness
- Deafness
- Heart conditions or seizures

BRADLEY & JERRI'S STORY

On a warm summer day in Alabama, Bradley, then 19, was with friends when he hit his head on a rock while diving off a waterfall. His C-6 spinal cord injury left him unable to walk or use his hands to complete many everyday tasks. Brad lives with his parents but spends most of the day alone while his parents work.

In April 2012, Brad was introduced to Jerri, his new service monkey. The two have had a great relationship ever since. Jerri helps Brad pick up objects off the floor, reach items in cabinets, and open containers and water bottles. Just as important, this endearing service animal provides Brad with a constant, loving, and entertaining companion.

Bradley explains the benefits of our program: "Jerri's here if I drop anything or to turn on the light, if I need her to. Mostly, I love her being here each day because it gives me a reason to get up in the morning."

Since 1979, Helping Hands: Monkey Helpers for the Disabled, Inc. has been serving adults with spinal cord injuries and other mobility impairments by matching them with a professionally trained service monkey to provide in-home assistance with daily tasks.

Helping Hands service monkeys bring more than just a willing set of nimble hands to their recipients. They also bring the emotional benefit of the human-animal bond. Our work encompasses all aspects of this service:

- We raise, train, and match the monkeys with carefully chosen recipients
- We provide extensive coaching and customized in-home training at the start of each placement
- We oversee each monkey's lifelong behavioral, nutritional, and medical needs
- We provide ongoing active support and mentoring for every partnership and retain ownership of each animal throughout his/her life



WHY A MONKEY?

Helping Hands service monkeys are highly trained and uniquely able to perform certain tasks that no other service animal can accomplish. Capuchin monkeys are a great match for our clients because of their small size (6-9 pounds as adults), dexterous hands, fine motor skills, and long life span.


Our monkeys are trained to:

- Retrieve dropped or out of reach objects
- Turn on/off light switches/push buttons for TVs, computers, and other electronics
- Help with a drink of water
- Turn pages of a book or magazine
- Scratch itches
- Reposition limbs on a wheelchair

Equally important to all of our recipients is the companionship, joy, and laughter that our monkeys provide which can help alleviate feelings of loneliness and depression.

WHO WE SERVE

The following is a breakdown of our active placements throughout the U.S.



We aim to make 6-8 new placements each year. Our service monkeys are placed at **no cost** with recipients—all of our work is supported by individual donors and foundation grants.

HOW TO REFER A PATIENT OR CLIENT

Helping Hands service monkeys are trained to help adults living with paralysis due to injury or illness if the patient also:

- Has unimpaired cognitive function
- Lives in an independent home environment (often with the assistance of family or caregivers)
- Requires help with everyday tasks within his or her home
- Would welcome the emotional benefits of the human-animal bond
